Jim White WS6K

I am sorry to announce the passing of Jim White, WS6K. From the mid-1980's until 1993, Jim was the lead operator for the Sacramento Blood Center's Amateur Radio station, and a leader in the California Blood Bank Society's Amateur Radio Net. He was a past president of the Sacramento Amateur Radio Club, and a member of the SARC Board since at least 1986. We met on the 40 meters CW Novice sub-band in 1986. He was an Extra-class ham, but he slowed down his code speed to accommodate me. He invited me to the next SARC meeting. I went and joined, and soon became involved in SARC and ARES/RACES activities. When I took over as lead operator for the SBC station in 1993, Jim agreed to stay on as the lead alternate operator. He provided me with a lot of useful advice and help over the years

I last saw Jim at the SARC meeting on September 8. He came up to me, and in a calm and matter-of-fact way informed me that he was scheduled to undergo brain surgery in a couple of weeks, to remove a growing tumor. He then asked to be temporarily removed as the #2 blood bank volunteer radio operator. Yet despite his illness and the looming surgery, he still found the time and strength to participate in the EMSA drill on September 16.

I do not have the details of his passing. I know that Carl Jensen, another one of the SBC radio volunteers, visited him in the hospital this past Saturday afternoon, and that his death was announced on the City RACES net this Monday evening. I have been told that a memorial service will be held for members of his family. And I will bring a sympathy card for his family to the October 13 SARC meeting, so that all his friends at the meeting can sign it.

Planning Efforts

Statewide Emergency Planning Committee (SWEPC). State agency member planning group which meets on a quarterly basis. Agenda throughout 1999 will address Y2K issues.

Y2K Emergency Preparedness
Task Force. Created by Executive
order D-3-99 on 2/17/99, the Task
Force will direct all Y2K
emergency preparedness efforts
through the Governor's Office of
Emergency Services (OES). The
Task Force meets bi-monthly.

SEMS Technical Group and Specialist Committees. To facilitate the mission of the Y2K Emergency Preparedness Task Force, OES has convened seven committees to evaluate possible Y2K problems within the arenas of medical/health, hazardous materials, transportation, utility and infrastructure, law enforcement, fire and rescue, and emergency human services. Over 200 people from various agencies and disciplines are involved in these committees. These committees have developed the planning assumptions, planning scenarios, and recommended actions that can be used for development of plans and millennium rollover exercises. These committees are overseen by the SEMS Technical Group.

California OES has developed the following documents:

Y2K Individual Preparedness Guide. Much of this material is based upon earthquake preparedness guidance. This document has been translated for non-English speaking populations and has been modified for vulnerable populations. It is also being prepared on audio tapes.

Y2K Potential Impacts Matrix Outlines potential impacts on a wide range of areas, such as utilities and infrastructure.

"The Year 2000 (Y2K):

Recommended Local Government Planning Actions." This document provides a broad guidance to local government on

Y2K planning, including contingency planning.

Y2K Questions & Answers.

Frequently asked questions received during presentations and through public contact.

The Year 2000 [Y2K] and Law Enforcement: A Need to Assess and Plan This document is the first in series discussing Y2K planning issues for law enforcement.

Year 2000 and Law Enforcement: Update and Survey Results - This updates information about law enforcement planning considerations and provides a summary of data from a Y2K law enforcement readiness survey. It is not available on-line, but can be requested by mail on law enforcement letterhead.

Y2K Survey. A survey designed to assess local government Y2K emergency preparedness and to provide data to support Y2K planning efforts. Results are being compiled and analyzed at present.

OES will be developing the following documents:

State Y2K Contingency Plan. OES will be working with local government, other state agencies, and the private sector to develop a statewide plan for the millennium rollover. This will be a major planning effort through Fall 1999. The foundation of the planning effort will be the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) and the State Emergency Plan. During July 1999, the "SEMS Y2K Specialist Committee Findings" and first iteration of the Plan was circulated for review and comment.

Outreach Documents. OES is working on personal and family preparedness guides for vulnerable populations, such as the homebound. OES is having key documents, such as the Individual Preparedness Guide, translated for non-English speaking populations. There will also be audio-tapes available.

Risk Communications Guide.

This document will discuss how public agencies can effectively and accurately convey disaster or emergency risks to the public. The document will have both a general risk focus as well as a Y2K specific annex.

Early Warning System. OES is developing an Early Warning System that will gather and assess impacts of Y2K in earlier time zones. Information will be transmitted through California's Response Information Management System (RIMS) which is tied to Federal agencies, key state


agencies and local government.
Currently OES is identifying
Essential Elements of Information
(EEI) to be fed into this system.
This system will include the federal
Information Coordination Center
(ICC), California's nine foreign
trade offices, and various business
partners in other countries.

Questions and Answers

The following is a condensation of the questions received at the seven Y2K Local Preparedness Workshops presented statewide in February and March.

Public Preparedness & Public Alerting

Q. Who will provide Y2K information to the public, private citizens, schools, disabled, etc. and how will that information be distributed?

A. OES has prepared an individual preparedness guide, "Y2K What2Do," now available on our website. We are reaching out to communities with Y2K preparedness presentations through workshops and community forums. The American Red Cross has many brochures available for Y2K and family preparedness. And, OES has links to more Y2K preparedness information through several city, county, and federal websites. The State is also urging local jurisdictions and local media to help get the information out to the public.

Q. Where can the public find reliable information?

A. Updates on the progress of governmental Y2K preparedness can be found on various government websites such as the United States Senate special Committee on the Year 2000

Technology Problem, www.senate.gov/~y2k, and the California Department of Information Technology at www.doit.ca.gov. Community preparedness information can be obtained by contacting your local city or county emergency services office.

Q. Will public school districts extend the 1999 Christmas vacation an extra week so that children will be home with their families during the Y2K turnover?

A. Please check with your children's respective school district office.

Q. With the anticipated abundance of human resources either on duty or on-call over the Y2K turnover period, how can the employees be assured of their family's safety?

A. Contact your employer to see if a special program is planned for families of staff who are on-call or on duty. Also, brochures providing individual and family emergency preparedness information, including Y2K, are available on the Governor's Office of Emergency Services website, from the American Red Cross(ARC) local offices, and the ARC website at www.redcross.org.

Utilities

Q. What is OES doing to assess the Y2K preparedness of gas and electric utilities?

A. OES is working closely with major utility companies and regulatory commissions to evaluate Y2K preparations in the electric, fuel, natural gas, telecommunications, potable water, and waste water fields. OES participated in the California Utility Emergency Association Y2K Workshop. In coordination with the California Energy Commission, regional workshops and exercises are being planned that will focus on this

issue. We are working closely with the Public Utilities Commission to assess the data they receive on utility contingency planning pursuant to the PUC's Resolution.

Communications

Q. How interrelated are phones with electricity?

A. All phone systems are dependent on electricity. However, if local electrical power is disrupted, telephone systems may still be operational as they often have backup power.

Q. How will overloaded phone lines be handled?

A. Telephone companies place excessive phone traffic into "spiking", or "overload management" mode. This mode has the critical response calls such as "911" programmed so they receive priority over others.

Electricity

Q. Will the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) impose penalties on those companies not in compliance?

A. The PUC requires updates and reports on utility Y2K readiness and has the authority to sanction utilities under certain circumstances. While companies are concerned about potential sanctions imposed on them by the PUC, they are equally concerned about customer satisfaction, liability issues, and competition with other companies.

Q. Is there any PG&E information for homeowners regarding installing generators?

A. There are very specific instructions about the installation of

generators, and the legal requirements. Information is available from PG&E by calling: 1-800-PGE-5000. The manufacturer's information should also always be read carefully.

Q. Are the electric companies working together on Y2K?

A. Many of the utility companies are working on the Y2K problem in coordination with the National Electric Reliability Council (NERC), the Electric Power Research Institute (EPRI), and the Edison Electric Institute (EEI).

Water and Waste Water

Q. Does the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) have any specific Y2K contingency plans for private well owners?

A. The SWRCB suggests regular contingency planning which includes backup power sources. Also, individuals can refer to FEMA's website at www.fema.gov for a checklist of contingency planning actions.

Q. Are there enough manual controls for flood control on local dams?

A. California dams are required to have back-up power. The smaller local dams have less reliance on computer systems making them less vulnerable.

Q. Will waste water treatment facilities be affected by Y2K?
A. Some waste water treatment facilities could be affected by Y2K. The SWRCB is presenting many workshops throughout the state for waste water treatment plants and handlers to help reduce problems with Y2K. Additional information is available on the SWRCB website, www.swrcb.ca.gov.

Food

Q. There is a lot of internet information that is alarming to the public with regards to the food supply.

A. The Y2K transition is not expected to cause widespread or severe disruptions in the food supply. Most large grocery chains already have several weeks inventory reserve of basic nonperishable foodstuffs in case of delivery problems or bad weather, so consumers are not likely to feel possible affects of short-term disruptions in most items.
